Tour of Building Part II

Part II of the school building tour will start in the middle hall or the junior high hall. Looking west, or from the front of the building down the first door on the right will go into the kitchen. The door across the hall is the entrance to the gym. The gym hasn't changed in appearance much. The seats have been recovered and the floor has been completely replaced. Mrs. Rev-elle still has a piece of the original floor. There have been new banners and new wall pads added just this year. We go down the hall and the door on the right is the maintenance room. There have been many changes due to updates in equipment over the years. The next door to the right is the history classroom which for a few years was math and science. The next door to the left is the door leading to the boys' locker room if you go down or if you go up the steps you will be on the stage. The stage used to be the music room. There are very large wooden accordion doors that would be shut so that music and PE or sports practice could go on at the same time. There were two small rooms on the north end that were for storage of instruments and practice rooms. The room on the south was the music teacher's office. Music storage was in the rooms above that which are accessed by ladders. This was used until they added on. The black curtains on the stage are also new and the blue front curtains replaced the original ones. Back in the hall to the right is a door that was the 8th grade classroom and is now occupied by Mrs. Stauffer. Part of the wall was removed on each side and windows were put in when the computer lab was added. That way a teacher could observe a student in the room and still have class in another room. The lab has been removed because we are now a one to one building. All students 7-12 have laptops. Across from this room is the entrance to the small gym which was part of the addition. On the wall in the small gym you can still see the service entrance where the trucks backed up and unloaded. The small gym has had the lights changed to more modern and brighter lights. The next room on the right was the 7th grade classroom which is currently the business room. Each classroom taught two of the four cores subjects. Across the hall is the current teacher's lounge. It has been a storage room. The next room on the right is the Distance Learning Lab. This was part of the addition and was the foreign language classroom. There were cubbies with tape players and you listened to your class for the day. On the other side is the band room which is part of the addition. As you go down the short hall on the left is the additional electrical needed for the addition. On the right there are two doors. This used to be the high school band storage and room for the students to make their own reeds and do minor maintenance on their instruments and the second door was the music teacher's office. There was a wall down the middle between where the two doors are to enter. It was the counselor's office, the teachers' lounge and special education teacher's office and classroom before it became the elementary lab and now just the lab. Outside the back doors is more of the addition. Outside the doors is the outside concession stand and bathrooms used for activities like football, track meets and field day.

Next time we will go in to the main lobby, offices and elementary hallway.

Tour of Building Part III

The last hallway is the elementary hallway. There have been very few changes to this hallway. The restrooms and classrooms have new sinks and some have new tile floor. When the pre-school was added a few years ago, the classes shifted down the hall. So Kindergarten went into the first grade and so on until fifth grade. The preschool and kindergarten share a restroom and the first and second share a restroom. After the fifth grade classroom the next room in the new addition was divided in two and stayed title and added special education. The last classroom in the hallway became 6th grade. The sixth grade had been the elementary library and then it was the special education room. The doors going outside were replaced this year. Across the hall from the title/sped room is a small hallway to the band room. There is a large storage room that still has marching band uniforms and instruments. Going down the hall there are restrooms. As you pass the handicapped assessable bathroom and the girls and boys restrooms you go to another small hall. If you go to the left you go in to the small gym. But you can go down the stairs to the girls' locker room. Go down the hall a little farther and there is a door into the gym. You can go into the gym or up the stairs to the stage. Down the hall a little farther and there is another doorway to the gym.

We are now to the front entrance and offices. The front doors haven't changed too much. The outer set of doors was added for security and weather. If you come in and turn left the first door to the left is the Bookkeeper's office which was the principal's office. The next door goes into the Secretary's office or the front office. This office has remained the same except for moving the counter shelving unit to different places. At one time it went across the doorway and you did everything over the counter from the doorway. It was also moved in the middle of the office and you could go on either side of it. It has been in its current location against the window for a long time. The principal's office now was the superintendent's office. The superintendent's office was divided. In the back were the sick beds and a small restroom and the front was the nurse's office. The back of counselor's room and Ken's room had no wall and was the board of education room. It had a large table that filled the room. The teachers used it to eat lunch and work. The room in front was the teachers' workroom. Presently the first room after the superintendent's office is the counselor's office. The next and last room on the front is the nurse's room and the technology room is in the back. With that, the tour of the main building is complete.
